PRAYER TO JESUS, THE GOOD SHEPHERD



THE ONE WHO KNOWS US BY NAME

Today's readings tell about the confusion and fear that followed Jesus' crucifixion and resurrection. In Acts, the people ask, "What are we to do?" after they are reminded that they were part of the death of Jesus, who was Lord and Christ. In First Peter we are reminded of Jesus' innocence. He did nothing to deserve the suffering and death that he experienced for us. Both the psalm and First Peter introduce the image of Jesus as shepherd. John's Gospel talks about Jesus as shepherd but not in the usual way. We recognize this shepherd's voice because he calls each of us by name. The confusion and fear we too often feel is calmed by the voice of the One who knows us by name.

WHAT ARE WE TO DO?

The readings describe that time when confused and frightened followers of Jesus looked to the apostles to tell them what to do after the Crucifixion and Resurrection. The answer seems simple. They must believe that Jesus, whom they crucified, is both Lord and Christ, both God and human. They must acknowledge their complicity in his death and seek forgiveness. They must be baptized. In First Peter the standard for their behavior is Jesus' behavior. Jesus, though free from sin himself, bore our sins and returned no insult or threat. Peter introduces the image of the shepherd who is the guardian of us who have gone astray. The Gospel emphasizes not the shepherd's leadership but that we are called by name.

LISTEN FOR YOUR NAME

The emphasis in John's Gospel is not on the leadership of the shepherd. The focus is specifically on the voice of the shepherd. We listen for the shepherd who calls us by name. We are not called to follow passively. We are called to recognize our name when it is spoken. We are to listen so that we can hear the voice of the One who knows who we truly are—not the external, transient realities like "I am a doctor" or "I am a mother." Our real name known to our Creator is much more than the roles we fill or the work we do. If my name is who I truly am, then I must listen for the One who calls me "forgiven" and "merciful" and "beloved." For this is my true name. This is my true nature.



Christ Jesus, Alpha and Omega: We adore you, O Christ. Christ Jesus, Head of the Body, the Church: We praise you, O Christ. Christ Jesus, present with us always: We love you, O Christ.

Concluding Prayer: God of every age and place, during this time when the patterns of everyday life have been superseded by drastic measures and emergency directives, give us the grace to live each day as fully as possible and to spend more time with you in prayer. Give us patience when we grow restless. Give us determination to focus on everyday actions that contribute to the long-term good of all. We pray through Christ our Lord. Amen.

WHAT IS "PERFECT CONTRITION"?

Penance (or confession or reconciliation) is the sacrament by which we are forgiven any sins we have committed after baptism, especially our mortal sins, so called because they bring about a kind of spiritual death. The forgiveness of grave sins ordinarily requires the Sacrament of Penance. However, what if we cannot get to confession as is happening right now because of the Pandemic? When sacramental penance is unavailable, it is important to remember that "perfect contrition" (a spiritual gift from God wherein we are truly sorry because our sins have offended God and we intend to not commit sin again) "obtains the forgiveness of mortal sins" if it includes the firm resolution to have recourse to sacramental confession as soon as possible" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 1452).

First, it helps to know that "contrition" comes from Latin and means "to grind into small pieces." In the Christian life, we talk about contrition as a kind of spiritual pulverizing, a breaking of our hard, stony hearts by sorrow when we have lost the grace of God and our own innocence. We should emphasize that we cannot produce contrition by our natural human efforts: It arises from supernatural charity, and is a gift from God. Contrition is voluntary, meaning it is something deliberate that involves a movement of our will. Contrition is not primarily a feeling or emotion; instead it is principally an active turning (conversion) of our will away from sin and toward God.

Perfect Contrition is also 1) Supernatural, 2) Supreme, and 3) Universal. In this context "Supernatural" means our contrition comes from the grace of God: We are sorry because we love God, not only because we are afraid of going to Hell, or dismayed by the inherent ugliness of sin, or disappointed in ourselves! "Supreme" means we are sorry because we know God is the highest good, and that sin, because it offends and separates us from Him, is the worst evil. It also means we deliberately reject sin more than we reject anything else, and choose God in preference to everything. Finally our contrition, to be perfect, must be "Universal," meaning it must apply to ALL our mortal sins, without exception. Even if we cannot remember each one of our sins at the moment, universal contrition is possible because we can still, in an instant, by God's grace, despise everything that is not pleasing to God. Our contrition is universal if we would reject every sin out of love for God, and forgive everyone who has sinned against us, regardless of whether we can, at the moment, actually recall every sin of ours or every person we ought to forgive.

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
PRAY WITH US DURING OUR LIVE STREAMED DAILY MASSES!

There is an ancient tradition in the Church of making a "Spiritual Communion." This began centuries ago when daily reception of the Eucharist was not allowed, and when some people could receive Holy Communion only once a year!

St. Alphonsus de Ligouri (1696-1787) wrote a very beautiful prayer for **"Spiritual Communion"** which you could pray every day:

Rest assured that, although Mass is currently not being celebrated publicly, the Carmelite Fathers are celebrating private Masses for all the above Mass intentions. When Mass is concelebrated, each priest offers the Mass for a separate intention. Thus you see that each of the Masses offered in the church has more than one Mass intention (one for each priest present).

Jesus the Gatekeeper

Of all the images of Jesus throughout the ages, what shows His tenderness and compassion more than the Good Shepherd? Even before Jesus' time, the image of a shepherd was used to describe the tenderness and provident care God shows us. In the Bible, "shepherd" was often

used as a political title to stress a king's obligation to provide for his subjects. The title connoted concern for and dedication to others. The image of the shepherd also expresses great authority. The entire Good Shepherd discourse in John 10:1-21 continues the theme of critique on the Pharisees at the end of Chapter 9. Nourishing the flock means that the Shepherd must protect them from heresy, ever ready to defend the sheep from marauders. The shepherd's rod is a defensive weapon against wild animals, while the staff is a supportive instrument symbolizing care and loyalty.

Before we consider the significance of the sheep gate, let us recall that in ancient Israel, the gates of Zion symbolized the very idea of entrance into God's presence. When Isaiah speaks of the day of universal peace, he describes it as a time when God's "gates shall stand open constantly; day and night they shall not be closed" (Isaiah 60:11). Likewise, the altar of holocausts was placed not within the tabernacle, but "in front of the entrance of the Dwelling of the meeting tent" (Exodus 40:6).

Christ is the fulfillment of all these expectations: He is the door through which we have "access to the Father" (Ephesians 2: 18). He is the "new and living way" (Hebrews 10:20).
