FROM THE PASTOR

THE JOY-FILLED WAY OF LOVE

been created to convey the truth that love is real. As Christians, we know that Love is of God. In laying down His life, Jesus pours out God's selfless, sacrificial, undying love. Jesus opens the door to a new relationship between God and humanity, that of friendship and intimate closeness. Jesus calls us to show this same love for others, knowing that in doing so, we fulfill God's will. As the account of Peter, Cornelius, and all in his household

our preconceived notions of the way things are in the world.

Part of the first reading from Acts (10:25-26, 34-35, 44-48) that we don't hear today is a vision Peter has in which God tells him that all foods are okay to eat; no longer are some unclean. He later realizes that the vision was a symbol that all people are "clean," Gentiles as well as Jews. All are

called to have faith in Jesus. Not all of the early Christians understood. The

Jewish Christians were shocked that the Holy Spirit would give gifts, such as speaking in tongues, to Gentiles—especially Gentiles who had not been baptized. We still need to follow St. Peter's example of sharing our faith in Jesus. Does that mean we should drag any non-believers we meet to church on Sunday or brag to them about how much we love God? How about introducing yourself to someone new to the parish that you see in church. Or offering to help the poor without waiting for them to beg. What about being courteous to other drivers, letting them go in front of you in heavy traffic. Make it a priority to see what you can do for others instead of what they can do for you. Perhaps part of your daily prayer can be asking God to show you who needs your (God's) love today.

The second reading from John (4:7-10) tells us that love is not people loving God; it's that God loved us first, enough to send His Son to die for us. We may think that we have chosen to love and follow Jesus, but as the Gospel tells us, Jesus chose us before we ever chose Him. So maybe that part about loving others as Jesus loves us is not so much about being willing to die for those you love. It may just be our willingness to love others without requiring that they love us first. Today's Gospel (John 15:9-17) gives us a hint at what we can do to bring others to Christ. Jesus makes it sound simple: Love one another as I love you (John 15:12). Remember that God's love for us comes first. That's why the Gentiles in the first reading received the gifts of the Spirit before they were baptized.

Love calls and causes us to do great things, more than we might believe we are capable of. While some are called to give their lives as martyrs, most of us find ourselves called to lay down our lives in smaller ways in the midst of everyday life. Parents lose sleep in the early months of their baby's life, and again as their teens mature and gain independence. Adult children change their plans in order to care for their aging parents. We hear the call of love as we become attentive and respond to the needs of the poor, lonely, sick, and vulnerable. Love causes us to turn our lives around, to strive to become more Christ-like in our words and actions. Peter followed this call of love when he entered the house of Cornelius, a Gentile. He was likely as astounded at the outpouring of the Holy Spirit as were the believers who accompanied him, yet love caused Peter to see beyond the accepted boundaries of religion and race, seeing instead evidence of the Lord's great love at work.

Following the Lord calls us to sacrifice for the sake of others, giving our attention, time, and resources in order to share Christ's care and compassion. Jesus shows us that giving of self, pouring ourselves out in love for another, is a joy -filled way of life. Joy is more than a feeling and is deeper than happiness. Joy comes with the assurance that Christ is with us when our lives mirror the life and way of our Master. Joy is a sense of fulfillment in knowing and sharing Christ's love. When we reach out in love, Christ's joy fills our hearts. Strengthened by the power of the Holy Spirit, we find the grace to follow Jesus' command to love one another.

MAY IS MARY'S MONTH!

But How Did This Tradition Begin?

For centuries, the Catholic Church has set aside the entire month of May to honor Mary, Mother of God. Not just a *day* in May, mind you, but the entire month. But just why is *May* Mary's month? There are many different factors that contributed to this association. First of all, in ancient Greece and Rome the month of May was dedicated to pagan goddesses connected to fertility and springtime (Artemis and Flora, respectively). This, combined with other European rituals commemorating the new season of spring, led many Western cultures to view May as a month of life and motherhood. This was long before "Mother's Day" was ever conceived, though the modern celebration is closely related to this innate desire to honor maternity during the spring months.

In the early Church there is evidence of a major feast of the Blessed Virgin Mary celebrated on the 15th of May each year, but it wasn't until the 18th century that May received a particular association with the Virgin Mary. According to the Catholic Encyclopedia, the May devotion in its present form originated at Rome where Fr. Latomia of the Roman College of the Society of Jesus, to counteract infidelity and immorality among the students, made a vow at the end of the eighteenth century to devote the month of May to Mary. From Rome the practice spread to the other Jesuit colleges and thence to nearly every Catholic church of the Latin rite."

Dedicating an entire month to Mary wasn't a new tradition, as there existed a prior

tradition of devoting 30 days to Mary called *Tricesimum*, which was also known as "Lady Month," and was started by the Catholic Church to replace the pagan custom began in Greece and Rome.

Pope Pius VII, in order to stir all Christian people to a greater devotion to the Blessed Virgin, granted (on March 21, 1815) a partial indulgence to all the faithful of the Catholic world who either in public or in private should honor the Blessed Virgin with some special homage or devout prayers, or other virtuous practices. In 1945, this same Pope solidified May as a Marian month after establishing the feast of the Queenship of Mary on May 31st. After the Second Vatican Council, this feast was moved to August 22, while May 31st became the feast of the Visitation of Mary.

It's common for parishes and/or schools to crown the statue of Mary during May—a custom known as the May Crowning. But May altars and crownings aren't just "church" things. We can and should be doing the same in our homes. When we echo the customs and traditions of the Church in our homes—our domestic churches—we participate more fully in the life of the Church.

If you haven't already, I encourage you to erect a prayer area in your home—either fancy or simple. The main point is that it's a place designated for God, and more specifically, for spending time with Him. Just as you need proper atmosphere to sleep, you also need proper atmosphere to pray. For May, give Mary a special spot in your prayer spot. It can be a statue or picture, but place there some representation of our Blessed Mother. Make it



appealing and a real tribute to her beauty and virtue. Then, crown the statue of Mary, simply or in an ornate ceremony of your own device. The meaning is far more important than the action. You can do it anytime during the month of May. Why? Not because it's a long-standing tradition in the Church, although it is. Not because there are any special graces connected to it, although there are. No, do it because Mary is Mother—your mother, my mother, everyone's mother—and because she cares for all of us day-in and day-out without fail, interceding for us in even the tiniest matters. For that, **she deserves an entire month in her honor.**

Feast of Faith

THE CREED

Following the readings and the homily, we stand together and say or sing the Creed, our profession of faith. The Creed is a solemn statement of belief, a "rule of

"We believe in one God the Father
All-sovereign, maker of heaven and earth, and of all things visible and invisible; and in one Lord Jesus Christ, the only-begotten Son of God, begotten of the Father before all the ages, Light of Light, true God of true God, begotten not made, of one substance with the Father, through whom all things were made; who for us men and for our salvation came down from the heavens, and was made flesh of the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary, and became man, and was crucified for us under Pontius Pilate, and suffered and was buried, and rose again on the third day according to the Scriptures, and ascended into the heavens, and sits on the right hand of the Father, and comes again with glory to judge the living and the dead, of whose kingdom there shall be no end:

"And in the Holy Spirit, the Lord and the Life-giver, that proceeds from the Father, who with the Father and Son is worshipped together and glorified together, who spoke through the prophets:

"In one holy catholic and apostolic church:

"We acknowledge one baptism unto remission of sins. We look for a resurrection of the dead, and

ement resurrection of the dead, and the life of the age to come.

faith" (General Instruction of the Roman Missal, 67). It states the core of what we believe about God the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. The language of the Creed is knotty and difficult at times, precisely because its purpose is to express with precision what we believe about God.

The Creed that we pray most often, the Nicene Creed, came out of the earliest ecumenical councils: Nicea in 325 and Constantinople in 381. It originated in a time of great controversy about the divinity of Christ, and thus the longest section of the Creed relates to Christ, truly human and truly God.

The Creed is both communal and personal: it is "we," but it is also "I." In the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults, it is only after listening to the teaching of the Church and professing faith in the Holy Trinity that the candidate is admitted to the Sacraments. So it is every Sunday. We listen to the word, we profess our faith, and then we come to the altar.

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
