

the Hall. Please join us one and all!!!


Today is an extra special day, the day our Mother and Queen was taken up body and soul into Heaven. What happened to her right away after her death (receiving her glorified body!) will—if we are faithful to her and her Son—happen to us one day in the not-so-far-off future!!! Here is some food for thought on the bodily Resurrection: all humans are immortal. All humans will rise—"those who have done good, to the resurrection of life, and those who have done evil, to the resurrection of judgment" (CCC, 998, quoting John 5:29; see also Daniel 12:2).

For the just, their glorified bodies will be incapable of dying, suffering, or sickness of any kind (impassibility). They will have a spiritualized body in the sense that their bodies will be both incorruptible and not bound by space, time, or the physical limitations that we now experience (subtlety). The glorified body will perfectly reflect and obey the spiritual soul (agility). We see these aspects in Christ appearing and disappearing, passing through locked doors, and so on. These aspects are attested to in Scripture when St. Paul writes of the glorified body: "Behold, I tell you a mystery. We shall not all fall asleep, but we will all be changed, in an instant, in the blink of an eye, at the last trumpet. For the trumpet will sound, the dead will be raised incorruptible, and we shall be changed. For that which is corruptible must clothe itself with incorruptibility and this, which is mortal, clothes itself with immortality, then the word that is written shall come about. 'Death is swallowed up in victory. Where, O death, is your victory? Where, O death, is your sting?' The sting of death is sin, and the power of sin is the law. But thanks be to God who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ (1 Corinthians 15:52-57).

But perhaps the most glorious aspect of the resurrected body is its radiant beauty (clarity). The resurrected bodies of the saints will reflect the radiant light of Christ. Jesus taught this in Matthew 13:43 when He said, "Then the righteous will shine like the sun in the kingdom of their Father." Each and every saint is perfected in every way. Each and every saint will be perfectly beautiful" (Mgsr. Stuart Swetlan, *The Catholic Digest*, July 12, 2021).

Let us keep praying and fasting and doing penance to help us repent of whatever sins may be contributing to the fires, the drought, the continuation of the pandemic, the attack on family life, and the other ills our country and the world are suffering from! Thank you one and all for your zeal and diligence and spirit of sacrifice at this crucial time!!!

OUR FINAL DESTINY

Today we celebrate the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary. The celebration of this feast on a Sunday is unusual on our Roman Catholic calendar. Our observance of the Lord's Day is held in such high esteem that few other feasts replace it. Occasionally there is a feast in which the saving power of God in Christ is so uniquely focused that the Roman rite deems it worthy of celebration on the Lord's Day. Today is such a feast. Yet some are surprised at the brevity of the dogma in its entirety: **"We pronounce, declare, and define it to be a divinely revealed dogma: that the Immaculate Mother of God, the ever-Virgin Mary, having completed the course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul to heavenly glory."** The Roman Catholic Church never defined any specifics or particulars about the event itself. It is not in the Scriptures. There are no verifiable eyewitness accounts. At its core, the dogma reveals in Mary the destiny of all mortal flesh, and reinforces our creedal belief in the resurrection of the body. This feast strengthens our faith, defined last week in Hebrews as the realization of things hoped for. We find, in Mary, that realization of what we all hope for, what Paul today affirms: "In Christ shall all be brought to life" (1 Corinthians 15:22).

In Mary's Assumption, we are assured that she is in the presence of God, pointing the way to all who live as God's good and holy people. Some traditions say that Mary was taken into Heaven before she died; others that immediately after death, she was taken to Heaven. The point was that Mary did not have to wait for her resurrection; it happened at the end of her life on earth. Catholics have believed this from the beginning of the Church, because it was thought that God would not let the body that had brought Christ into the world undergo the corruption of death.

The second reading assures us that while everyone will someday die, "in Christ shall all be brought to life." Jesus was the first to be raised from the dead by the Father, but not the last. **Mary in the Scriptures is a symbol of all believers, so we know that God raised her to show us that we too will be raised.** Now some might argue that since Mary was free from sin, she deserved to be taken up, but none of us can claim the same privilege. But Mary would not say that she deserved it. Instead, she calls herself a "lowly servant" and praises God for His mercy. We too are "lowly servants" who can bring Christ into the world through our love and good examples.

Catholics are sometimes accused of praying to Mary, as if she were equal to God. Actually, we ask her intercession for our needs. But whatever you call it, we know that Mary is alive in Christ. We trust that Mary wants to help us in any way she can, and so we can confidently ask her intercession for our needs.

Mary's holiness is found in her belief in God and her willingness to carry out God's plan by carrying the Child Jesus in her womb. In what ways are you willing to carry out God's plan? Mary's response to Elizabeth is known as the "Magnificat". Mary "magnifies" the greatness of the Lord—through her, we see God's mercy clearly. This, Mary says, is the God for whom the people of Israel had long waited. This is God in whom we believe. Like Mary, the Almighty has done great things for us. How will you glorify and magnify, the Lord by your life?

The Shape of the Eucharistic Prayer

Our Eucharistic Prayers originated in the traditional Jewish meal prayers known as "berakah," which were prayers of thanksgiving used at meals. Over the centuries, the Christian thanksgiving, or Eucharist, gradually took shape. While in the East the Eucharistic Prayers (called anaphora) took many forms, in the Roman Church there was—for many centuries—just one Eucharistic Prayer, called the Roman Canon (now known as Eucharistic Prayer I).

Almost all Eucharistic Prayers include the same basic elements. They begin with thanksgiving and acclamation. Then there is an "epiclesis," as the priest calls down the Holy Spirit upon the gifts. Then follows the institution narrative and consecration, as the words that Jesus spoke at the Last Supper are repeated. After the consecration, we remember in an explicit way all that Christ has done for us this is the "anamnesis," or remembering. The prayer concludes with the offering, the intercessions—prayers for the Church, our leaders, ourselves—and a final doxology of praise.

The reforms of the Second Vatican Council enriched our liturgy with additional Eucharistic Prayers, including both ancient texts (Eucharistic Prayer II is based on the most ancient of all existing Eucharistic Prayers) and new compositions.



The soul that is clouded the bv desires is darkened in the understanding and allows neither the sun of natural reason nor that of supernatural the Wisdom of God to shine upon it and illumine it clearly. At the same time, when the soul is darkened in the understanding, it is benumbed also in the will, and the



memory becomes dull and disordered in its dire operation. The intellect cannot get the illumination of God's wisdom, the will cannot get the love of God, and the memory cannot get God's image. Darkness and coarseness will always be with a soul until its appetites are extinguished. The appetites are like a cataract on the eye or specks of dust in it; until removed they obstruct vision. The affections and appetites deprive them of a treasure of divine light. Any appetite, even one that is but slightly imperfect, stains and defiles the soul (Book 1, Chapter 8).

All that is required for a complete pacification of the spiritual house is the negation through pure faith of all the spiritual faculties and gratifications and appetites. This achieved, the soul will be joined with the Beloved in a union of simplicity and purity and love and likeness. #3. In the night of sense there is yet some light, because the intellect and reason remain and suffer no blindness. But his spiritual night of faith removes everything, both in the intellect and in the senses. The less a soul works with its own abilities, the more securely it proceeds, because its progress in faith is greater (Book 2, Chapter 1, No. 2).
