

FROM OUR PASTOR

St. Teresa of Avila THE WAY OF PERFECTION



Hello everyone, and blessed Afterglow of the Solemnity of St. Teresa of Jesus (Avila) two days ago!! Thanks to her (and St. John of the Cross), we have Discalced Carmelite Friars and Nuns here in Alhambra, and across the globe, sharing with anyone interested the riches of the Journey Into Inner Space, an even more fascinating journey than the Journey Into Outer Space! Maybe Elon Musk wouldn't agree with that, but hopefully you who are reading this have enough spiritual experience to agree wholeheartedly with my claim. No matter how far any of us travels physically into outer space, we each still carry our wounded and (hopefully) healing heart and mind and soul and body with us. St. Teresa, a doctor of prayer, reminds us that, "In the measure in which you desire Him you will find Him" (the Father, the Son, the Holy Spirit) [The Way of Perfection, Chapter 26, No. 3]. She also says, "O Lord, how true that all harm comes to us from not keeping our eyes fixed on You [Jesus]; if we were to look at nothing else but the Way, we would soon arrive. But we meet with a thousand falls and obstacles and lose the Way because we don't keep our eyes—as I say—on the True Way" (Way, Ch. 16, No. 11). If we really put that into practice over and over, every hour and minute, would we need to worry, like John and James and the other ten apostles in today's Gospel, about who gets what place in Heaven?

October 17, 2021

This Friday is the feast day of Pope St. John Paul II. With his guidance from Heaven, we will begin a series from 7:00 to 8:15 p.m., this Friday, October 22, in the Guadalupe Garden/Avila Room (and then every second and fourth Friday of the month)—discussing and praying through his book, *Man and Woman He Created Them*, otherwise known as his *Theology of the Body*. We will be using PowerPoint with audio and video clips and quotes from his book.

If you can't come or prefer to study from home, call the office and leave your email address, and we can send you the link to the PowerPoint. To conclude our weeks' long look at healing from fear, here is a final meditation and prayer:

Today, I choose to **FEAST on abstinence and safety/security**. Abstinence is the virtue that replaces gluttony, and safety/security is the healing of fear. By keeping our focus on the giver of every gift rather than on the gifts that he provides, we are able to grow in abstinence. In today's Gospel reading, Jesus shows us that no gift is beyond Him, including the supernatural gift of life. Mary and Martha have sent word to Jesus that Lazarus is dying. But Jesus isn't in any particular rush to return to Bethany to heal Lazarus.

When Jesus finally arrives, Martha says to him, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died" (John 11:21). She is focused on the gift and not the giver. Jesus is the giver, and every gift is within His power. Even as Jesus commands the tomb to be opened, Martha warns that Lazarus's body will smell. But upon seeing the supernatural power of Jesus, she comes to believe and to trust.

"I give them eternal life, and they shall never perish. No one can take them out of my hand. My Father, who has given them to me, is greater than all, and no one can take them out of the Father's hand " (John 10:28-29).

Take time to yourself.... How am I secure in Jesus? What are some ways I can focus on God as giver?


Pray slowly: Heavenly Father, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, and by the power of the Holy Spirit, I accept the gifts of abstinence and security/safety in my life. I accept my identity as the beloved child of a gracious Father God. I thank you for my life's purpose and the strength to fulfill it. I accept your healing grace. Amen.

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THE RESULTS OF EMPOWERMENT

In Acts 4 and 5, we find the apostles testifying with great power, while all the believers were ministering to the poor among them in a unity of love that resulted from the empowerment of the Holy Spirit. The apostles were performing many signs and wonders, with the result that many believers were added to their number. It was the power of God accompanying the preaching of the apostles that caused the Church to grow, and this is still true today. Not only were the apostles boldly proclaiming the word, but all of those present were also empowered by being filled with the Holy Spirit, enabling them to speak the word of God boldly. The emergence of the social justice aspect of the Gospel, as seen in Acts 6:1-6, caused further growth .



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Luke gives us a picture of the tremendous faith expressed by

the crowds that gathered from around Jerusalem, bringing their sick and those tormented by evil spirits (Acts 5:12-16). This faith must have come from hearing the testimony of others, just as occurred in Jesus' own ministry. People were healed even by simply having Peter's shadow fall on them. It was not Peter's shadow that healed, but God's energy that was at work within him. It may have been people's faith regarding the gift of healing in Peter that activated their healing, or it is possible that the anointing on Peter was so strong that it extended beyond his physical body to heal people?

The connection between grace and power was demonstrated in Stephen, "full of grace and power," who "was doing great wonders and miraculous signs among the people" (Acts 6:8). Stephen preached with such great wisdom in the power of the Spirit that the glory of God was manifested through him (verse 10). Later, we see further fruit from the outpouring of the Spirit. Luke states that "they were all scattered throughout the regions of Judea and Samaria, except the apostles," and that "those who were scattered went about preaching the word" (Acts 8:1,4). (They had been scattered due to persecution.) Among those scattered was Philip, who led a great evangelistic campaign in Samaria (Acts 8:5-25). It is reasonable to believe that Stephen and Philip were present for the prayer meeting reported in Acts 4:29-31, and that they and many others were overwhelmed by the Holy Spirit and were enabled to preach the word boldly with signs and wonders, as the Church had prayed.

The lay Christians who had been scattered from Jerusalem continued to evangelize, "and a great many people were added to the Lord" (Acts 11:24). Again, the hand of the Lord was with them. It is important to note that the Church at Antioch was born through the ministry of people who were not part of the twelve apostles, but who were touched in that prayer meeting and scattered after Stephen's martyrdom. They were moving in the boldness they had prayed for, and in the signs and wonders for which they had prayed.

FOLLOW THE MASTER EVENING MASSES/DEVOTIONS

While James and John seem to be close friends of Jesus, they still have not learned what it means to follow Him. Jesus doesn't promise worldly glory, but a share in His suffering. Imagine their surprise when He told them that the greatest of them would be the ones who served the rest.

How many people today know that leadership is a form of service? Whether you are head of a family, or of a nation, you were given that authority by God. And God expects leaders to not only direct those under them, but inspire and encourage them to do better. This connection of leadership and service is all inclusive. A manager is called to help his employees do their jobs better—not by badgering, but by giving the support they need. Military leaders must support their troops with respect as well as discipline.

God calls Church leaders in a special way to service of their flock: to protect the weakest members, to give an example of Jesus' love to all, and to be open to the movement of the Holy Spirit in both clergy and laity. **Anyone who lives a life of loving service can be "greatest" in the Kingdom of God.** * MONDAY CONTEMPLATIVE CANDLELIGHT MASS: Fr. October 17, 2021

Today's Old Testament selection, from Isaiah's "Fourth Song of the Suffering Servant of God," describes God's Servant as one who "gives His life as an offering for sin" (Isaiah 53:10) and celebrates the mighty power of that self-offering: "through His suffering, my servant shall justify many, and their guilt He shall bear" (53:11). Jesus incarnates the redemptive suffering that Isaiah foresaw in the offering of God's Servant, as well as the covenantal restoration that the Servant's sacrificed achieved. The reading from Hebrews confirms our finding peace in continually learning from Jesus, whatever our deepest flaws and trials: for Jesus, our "great high priest" (Hebrews 4:14) is not "unable to sympathize with our weaknesses," for Jesus was "tested in every way" that we are (4:15).

Just before today's Gospel episode, Jesus informed the Twelve: "Behold, we are going up to Jerusalem, and the Son of Man will be handed over to the chief priests and the scribes, and they will condemn Him to death and hand Him over to the Gentiles who will mock Him, spit upon Him, scourge Him, and put Him to death, but after three days He will rise" (Mark 10:33–34). Despite Jesus' three predictions and His definition of "glory" and "power" as serving others in humility, James and John still imagine Jesus as bound for a glorious earthly messiahship. How moving that Jesus, rather than scolding them as He had previously rebuked Peter, instead begins teaching them patiently, "You do not know what you are asking" (10:38).

Knowing that Jesus' throne of glory is also a "throne of grace," from which Jesus bestows "mercy and grace for timely help" (Hebrews 4:16), today's Gospel suggests sincere self-examination: How do we approach Jesus and make our requests? What do we ask for: what Jesus wants us to do or, like James and John today, do we demand "whatever we want" from Jesus? Does the world in which we live and work focus our hearts on glory to the right and power on the left? Or does "the cup we drink," "the baptism" we've received inspire us to gladly become servants of all, like the Jesus who has made us His disciples? Do we also avoid imitating the "indignant ten" other Apostles who rebuked James and John? Or are we also quick to see the errors of others and rash in passing judgment on them? How do we live in response to Jesus who gave his life "as a ransom for many"?



October 17. 2021 A continuing bulletin feature, excerpted from The Passion of St . Therese of Lisieux by Bishop Guy Gaucher—Issue 7



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Relations with her community: As we cannot study in detail Therese's relationship with each of the nuns, we shall just look briefly at her position in the community in 1897. Reflecting on fraternal charity, she asked herself how Jesus had loved His disciples: "Ah, it was not their natural qualities which would have attracted Him." In fact, in the Carmel of Lisieux these gualities were somewhat lacking. On the intellectual level, the standard was rather low. Some sisters had done some studies. Several had worked as domestics or had come from their family farms directly to Carmel.

The lack of culture, the temperamental differences and the setting did not encourage human relationships. Therese realized that, if one does not have "enemies" in Carmel, there are "feelings." "You feel attracted to one sister, and with regard to another, you would make a long detour to avoid meeting her. And so, even without realizing it, she becomes a subject of persecution." We naturally avoid "imperfect souls". "When I speak of imperfections, I am not speaking of spiritual imperfections, since even the holiest souls will be perfect only in

Heaven; but I want to speak of the lack of judgment, upbringing, the touchiness of certain characters—all these things which don't make life very pleasant." Therese was speaking from experience. In June 1897, she no longer had any illusions, for she adds: "I know very well that these moral infirmities are chronic, that there is no hope of a cure..."

In March 1896, Sr. Marguerite-Marie was admitted as a patient to the Bon-Sauveur at Caen for the second time, and in June returned to her family. Sr. Therese of Jesus, of Polish origin, and Sr. Marie of Saint-Joseph, the neurasthenic sister in the linen room, whom Therese wanted to help with her work, were both to leave the community in 1909. Then there was Mother Hermance of the Heart of Jesus, a difficult patient who made her infirmarians want to flee from her. If we include Sr. Therese of Saint-Augustine who had "the faculty of displeasing me in everything, her manner, her words, her character, everything about her seems very disagreeable to me," we see that Therese's natural sympathies, apart from the four members of her family, would have extended to only a few sisters. In such a setting, we can also appreciate the sentiments she expressed in this reflection: "The goods which come directly from God, inspirations of the mind and heart, profound thoughts, all these are a form of riches to which we are attached, as if they were ours and which no one has the right to touch..."

If Therese was aware of the human condition of her community, the sisters for their part, at that time, were divided in their opinion about her. We say "at that time"; but, in fact, all the evidence given at the Processes has to be used with a good deal of discernment. Firstly, because these witnesses were partial. Secondly, because without questioning the witnesses' sincerity, Therese's death and subsequent triumph had "influenced their ideas". Without denying the interest of this evidence, we have to try to recapture the real situation of the saint, according to the oldest documents that relate the contemporary facts. For after Therese's death, many eyes were opened and genuine conversions took place. The dear sister even seems to have gone out of her way to favor in a special way those who had little appreciation of her during her lifetime.

On the whole, the majority of the nuns held her in high regard. Therese knew this, and said that she was "showered with praises". She describes herself, not without a certain humor, as following "the road of honors". Sr. Genevieve said at the Diocesan Process that "some of the senior nuns, seeking her advice, used to go to her, like Nicodemuses-in secret". Mother Hermance, the sick nun, had a "high regard for her virtue" and used to correspond with her. Sr. Saint-John of the Cross was one who sought her good advice. Sr. Marie-Emmanuel was of the same opinion as Mother Marie de Gonzague and "would have liked her to be prioress-even being only twenty-two". The community was unanimous in its appreciation of Therese's poetical ability and talents. The pious plays that she wrote and performed had aroused the enthusiasm of the nuns. She was often asked to write little poems for special occasions.

Therese knew all this. If she "was seen by the community as a religious full of faults, incapable, without understanding or judgment," she would hardly have been of use in the novitiate. But, at the same time, she was not unaware of the reservations held by some of the sisters. In May, thinking of what good the sisters would see in her if they were asked, she said: "One would say, 'She is a good little soul'. Another would say: 'She is very gentle, very pious, but...' Several would find me very imperfect, which is true." In the infirmary, Therese was soon to hear the echo of those reservations.

On the whole, the community's attitude was positive. "In the eyes of creatures, I succeed in everything. I walk the road of honors, insofar as this is possible in religious life," she wrote. She compared her Carmel to a "delightful oasis" where she lived happily under the "motherly care" of Mother Marie de Gonzague. If she would "have to leave the Carmel for the missions, it would not be without pain," she wrote to her prioress, "for here, I am loved by you and all the sisters, and this affection is very sweet to me."


