FROM OUR PASTOR



Blessed Feast of the Baptism of the Lord Jesus Christ and continued Epiphany blessings all the way to February 2nd!!!

Do you know the day of your own Baptism?? (mine is July 19th). And do you celebrate it with family and friends?? If you don't, then this Feast of Jesus' Baptism won't mean much. He didn't let John baptize Him for His own sake, but to cleanse and free us from sin and death, and to give us access and intimacy with the Father in the Spirit as His beloved sons and

daughters. The more you and I appreciate, celebrate, live out our baptismal identity as beloved sons and daughters, the more we will experience this supernatural life that is already ours!!!

We want to make this mission statement from Encounter Ministries (held on Mondays from 6:00 to 9:00 p.m., at St. Philip the Apostle Church in Pasadena) our own here at St Therese Church: "Drawing from the riches of our Catholic identity [as beloved baptized daughters and sons who regularly experience their Father's love for them], we teach, equip, and activate disciples to demonstrate that love of the Father through His Son Jesus in the power of the Holy Spirit." In other words, we no longer have to settle for a natural life of "I need/want to do A, B, C, so that I can have X, Y, Z, and then one day, hopefully, I'll be loved and accepted and finally be somebody special." We can—right now—enjoy a supernatural relationship and intimacy with the Trinity, and from that, have a supernatural Joy and Peace, and from that, do all kinds of things that help others experience Jesus. "I already am totally special, and have/enjoy supernatural Peace, and then do things to release that same Peace of Jesus in others." (By the way, recently a young man shared with me that he was on the phone with his mother while driving up the 110 Freeway, and she was telling him about some of her usual chronic back pain. Right then and there, he trusted in his baptismal authority over disease and pain, and asked his mother if she would like some prayer for the pain. She said, "Yes, I believe that Jesus wants to help me!" And, so, he prayed with her in the Name of Jesus over the phone and her chronic pain went away. I can't remember if he said "completely away" or "almost completely away". Either way, she experienced a huge amount of relief, thanks to her son praying with her over the phone...in the Name of Jesus!

Here is another way of looking at our fundamental identity (from the Liturgy of the Hours' Morning Prayer antiphon of Epiphany): "Today the Bridegroom claims His Bride, the Church, since Christ has washed her sins away in Jordan's waters; the Magi hasten with their gifts to the royal wedding; and the wedding guests rejoice, for Christ has changed water into wine, alleluia." Did you catch that? Jesus, speaking through His Church's Liturgy, is saying, "My Baptism, My being honored by the Magi, and My changing water into wine at Cana... well, it's all about YOU and My desire to have YOU as My Bride, if you are willing! What do you say? Would you like a life with Me that will be better than the best marriage that you could possibly imagine, and a life that is meant to begin NOW, not just after this life?? Will you have Me as your Spouse?"

So, then, our identity is not only one of beloved daughters and sons, but *spouses* of the Blessed Trinity! Doesn't that send a thrill through your whole body?! It will if you allow yourself to trust that God doesn't lie, but wants you to take Him absolutely seriously, no matter what your gender, profession, age, or state in life might be!!!


CHURCH CALENDARS FOR 2022

FROM TODAY'S FIRST READING: A voice cries out: In the desert prepare the way of the LORD! Make straight in the wasteland a highway for our God! Every valley shall be filled in, every mountain and hill shall be made low; the rugged land shall be made a plain; the rough country, a broad valley. Then the glory of the LORD shall be revealed, and all people shall see it together; for the mouth of the LORD has spoken (Isaiah 40:3-5).



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JESUS' GIFT FOR YOU...

Let's explore what St. Luke says about the gifts in his second volume, the book of Acts. Luke's record reinforces what Paul says about the gifts in his epistles, although there is a difference in emphasis. Paul and Luke look at the work of the Holy Spirit through two different lenses. While Paul focuses mostly on the Holy Spirit's inner work of sanctification and His role in relation to our new life in Christ, Luke focuses mostly on the Holy Spirit's bestowing of power for ministry. Our theology of the Holy Spirit is enriched when we allow both of these emphases to speak, rather than when we try to conform the Spirit's activity to only one or the other.



At the beginning of Acts, we find Jesus giving instruction to

His disciples about the promised Holy Spirit (Acts 1:4-8). The disciples are operating in their own strength, but they will receive power from the Holy Spirit to be witnesses of the Gospel, testifying to all the known world, with miracles accompanying. Their commission has been enlarged, and they will carry it out filled with courage and zeal and all the gifts necessary to accomplish the task set before them.

Jesus' promise is fulfilled soon afterward, at Pentecost, when the 120 disciples are gathered in the Upper Room in Jerusalem (Acts 2:1-4). Some of those present—the apostles—had already received the Holy Spirit on the night of the resurrection, when Jesus breathed on them and said, "As the Father has sent me, even so I am sending you... Receive the Holy Spirit" (John 20:21-22). For the others who had not been present that night, the Upper Room was their initial filling with the Spirit. The coming of the Spirit was marked by audiovisual phenomena: the sound of the blowing of a mighty wind (an audible experience), the fire that separated into what looked like tongues that came and rested on each of them (a visual experience), and the experience of speaking in languages they had not learned, as enabled by the Spirit. The overwhelming divine life and power brought by the Holy Spirit made the disciples appear as if they were drunk.

Peter addressed the crowd, explaining that the outpouring of the Spirit was the fulfillment of prophecy spoken by the prophet Joel (Acts 2:14; Joel 2:28-32). At the end of his Pentecost sermon, Peter gave the command to repent and be baptized in order to receive the gift of the Holy Spirit. He concluded by saying that this gift is "for you and for your children and for all who are far off—everyone whom the Lord our God calls to Himself" (Acts 2:39), which means it was not just for those in the first generation of the Church.

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Fasting from the Sin of Pride

PAUSE TO HEAR GOD SPEAK:

"To believe one does not need counsel is a great pride." -St. Basil the Great

"He has shown might with his arm, dispersed the arrogant of mind and heart. He has thrown down the rulers from their thrones but lifted up the lowly."

-Luke 1:51-52



Today, I choose to fast from the sin of pride. Wouldn't it be great to wake up every morning and feel the love of God penetrating every part of you, knowing that He loves you to the core of your being? I don't know about you, but that's not exactly how it works for me. Instead, it's all too easy to feel

alone. Rather than feeling like a beloved child, we feel like orphans who have to make our way in a hostile world. Our response to these deep feelings can be both powerful and destructive because of how quickly we replace the confidence that we long to receive from God with a shallow confidence in ourselves. Our thoughts, beliefs, and emotions tell us, "You don't need anybody," "You don't need help," and "You can do this on your own." Instead of depending on God, we depend on ourselves and our own strength.

St. Thomas Aquinas calls pride "the love of one's own excellence" (Summa, II:II:162). The loud, bombastic egotist is an obvious caricature of a person, but pride is equally at home inside our quiet piety, false humility, and self-reliance. You can see pretty quickly why St. Gregory the Great, and St. Thomas Aquinas after him, considered pride to be the queen of all vices. Let's take a few minutes to see the ways in which we let pride into our lives as we try to save ourselves instead of trusting ourselves to God.

Take time to ask yourself ... In what ways am I prideful? How does my pride affect my view of God?

Pray slowly... Heavenly Father, In the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, I renounce pride and repent all the ways in which I have sinned because of it. I reject every form of pride in my life. I ask you, Father, to forgive me, and I forgive myself for my prideful heart and actions. Holy Spirit, make me aware of any prideful thoughts, feelings, and actions. Amen.

Quiet Listening Prayer

From *The Living Flame of Love*By St. John of the Cross

(Guidance = "God, You I Dance," for entering into contemplative prayer). Therefore, directors should not impose meditation on persons in this state, nor should they oblige them to make acts or strive for satisfaction and fervor. Such activity would place an obstacle in the path of the principal agent who, as I say, is God, who secretly and quietly inserts in the soul loving wisdom and



knowledge, without specified acts; although sometimes He makes specific ones in the soul for a certain length of time. Thus individuals also should proceed only with a loving attention to God, without making specific acts. They should conduct themselves passively, as we have said, without efforts of their own but with the simple, loving awareness, as when opening one's eyes with loving attention.

Since God, then, as the Giver communes with individuals through a simple, loving knowledge, they also—as the receivers—commune with God through a simple and loving knowledge or attention, so knowledge is thus joined with knowledge and love with love. The receiver should act according to the mode of what is received, and not otherwise, in order to receive and keep it in the way it is given. For, as the philosophers say: "Whatever is received is received according to the mode of the receiver." It is obvious that if persons do not lay aside their natural active mode, they will not receive that good except in a natural mode; thus they will not receive it, but will remain only with their natural act. For the supernatural does not fit into the natural mode, nor does it have anything to do with it. If individuals should, then, desire to act on their own through an attitude different from the passive loving attention we mentioned, in which they would remain very passive and tranquil without making any act unless God would unite himself with them in some act, they would utterly hinder the goods God communicates supernaturally to them in the loving knowledge. This loving knowledge is communicated in the beginning through the exercise of interior purgation, in which the individual suffers, as we said, and afterward in the delight of love (Stanza III, Nos. 33-34).
