Blessed 24th Sunday in Ordinary Time, everyone!



My apologies about any confusion regarding the celebration of the Masses last Wednesday and Thursday. We received a last-minute notice that our Carmelite meetings in Redlands were suddenly cancelled, and so we needed to let everyone know that we were back to the regular schedule for last week. I hope you were able to enjoy Our Lady's Birthday celebration on Thursday by stopping by for some Adoration, for Mass, or for healing prayer after the 7:00 p.m. Mass, as well as to the potluck in the Hall afterwards.

Today's Gospel is one of the most well-known and most powerful Gospel passages ever. Notice how generous the father is to both sons, and how much healing each of them needs around the truth of their identity. Neither of them has a good awareness of who their father really is and who they really belong to: an amazing prodigal father who lavishes his love on both of his sons. Finally, the younger son wakes up and realizes that, under any conditions, it is

still better to be part of his father's family than to be outside of that family. But his father won't even allow him to finish his rehearsed speech and be a servant in the family! Instead, he runs out and gives him three things: a ring, a robe, and sandals—symbols of the son's fundamental identity as king, priest, and prophet in his father's family.

You and I too share—by our Baptism—in that fundamental identity in Our Lord Jesus as Priest, Prophet, and King!!! That is your and my deepest identity, and it can't be earned but simply received from God! From that identity, then, flow the authority and power to represent our Heavenly Father well, to do signs and wonders ourselves in the Name of His Son, Jesus Christ. Let us now continue meditating on the transforming power of the Seven Sacraments (today's excerpt is on the healing power of the Holy Eucharist—see box below).

ABIDING PRESENCE: How Holy Communion Heals Wounds of Abandonment

(From Chapter Four of **Be Transformed: The Healing Power of the Sacraments** by Bob Schuchts) | 4th installment The Sacrament of Holy Communion is a participation (koinonia) in heavenly worship (CCC, 1326). Are we cognizant of participating with the Hosts of Heaven when we worship together? It also calls this Sacrament "a bond of charity" and "a sign of unity" (CCC, 1323). Within ourselves and our communities, are we really operating in unity like the early Church; can most of us say we are experiencing authentic communion (koinonia)? Why then do we call this sacrament Holy Communion when these most essential elements are neglected in our worship and community life?

The problem is obviously not on Jesus' end. His real presence in the Eucharist truly does bring the reality of Heaven to earth. His Body and Blood are the source of our charity and unity. Giving Himself completely to us, He makes us one body with Him and with one another. Yet, how many of us daily embody this reality of Jesus' abiding presence? Our wounds of abandonment and sins of isolation and selfishness seem to get in the way of true fellowship (koinonia)-first in relationship with Jesus and then with one another.

The Scriptures and Church teaching, as well as our own experiences, confirm that there can be no genuine unity or communion without selfgiving love. In the words of St. John Paul II, "To celebrate the Eucharist, 'to eat His Flesh and drink His Blood,' means to accept the wisdom of the cross and the path of service. It means that we signal our willingness to sacrifice ourselves for others, as Christ has done." In his insightful book, Life of the Beloved, Henri Nouwen offers a vision of what self-sacrificing love looks like as we actively practice the sacrament of Holy Communion in our daily lives. Just as Jesus took the bread (as his Body), blessed it, broke it, and gave it to His disciples at the Last Supper. He calls us to follow His example in Holy Communion (Matthew 26:26). When we offer ourselves as living sacrifices in worship (Romans 12:1), Jesus also "takes us," "blesses us," "breaks us," and "gives us" so that we can participate with Him in His holy self-offering.

Notice the sequence of events. First, Jesus takes us and makes us an eternal offering to the Father, with Himself. We are reminded that our lives do not belong to us (1 Corinthians 6:19, Romans 14:8). We were given to the Father in Baptism. Every time we celebrate Holy Communion, we are invited to reaffirm the reality that we are one with Jesus and an integral part of His Body, the Church. After taking us into His hands, Jesus then blesses us. Blessing, as we have already noted, is receiving the presence and grace of God in our lives. When we receive Him in Holy Communion, Jesus sanctifies us and makes us holy. We in turn bless Him with our praise and thanksgiving (CCC, 1078). In the Eucharist, which literally means "great thanksgiving," we become a thanksgiving offering in communion with Jesus. He blesses us so that we can share His presence with others. But first we need to be broken.

Following the blessing, Jesus breaks us. I can personally testify that this is the part most of us want to avoid. The breaking process is not always easy or fun, but neither was the cross for Jesus. Without the breaking of our pride and self-sufficiency, we cannot have unity or true communion (koinonia) with Jesus or one another.



The Real St. Therese



This is the latest installment from Guy Faucher's book, The Passion of Therese of Lisieux

Three days after writing the lyrical and passionate poem (included at the end of the September 4th bulletin installment), Therese received a great grace: "I was just beginning the Way of the Cross

when suddenly I was seized with such a violent love for God that I can't explain it, except by saying it was as if I had been totally plunged into fire. Oh! What fire and what sweetness at the same time! I was on fire with love, and I felt that one moment, one second more, and I wouldn't have been able to sustain this ardor without dying. I understood, then, what the saints were saying about these states which they experience so often. As for me, I experienced it only once and for a single moment, then fell back immediately into my habitual state of dryness" (Last Conversations, 7.7.2). Let us note that it was while she was making the Way of the Cross that the seal of acceptance was seemingly placed on her Offering by this fire.

Therese was to live in hope. Death was going to come. She would die of love. But when? "Ever since I was young, God gave me the feeling that I would die young," Therese told Mother Agnes. Five days later, on July 18, 1897, she wrote to Abbe Belliere: "I have never asked God to let me die young. It would have seemed to me cowardice. But from my childhood, He has given me the deep conviction that my course here would be brief." We must not forget that it was about this time that she saw in the stem broken close to the roots a symbol of her life. She thought that the good God "seems to be saying by this that He'll soon break the bonds of His little flower; He will not allow her to fade away on this earth!" Presentiments? —or physical symptoms that we do not know about?

2. From the act of oblation to the entrance into '"the tunnel" (June 1895-April 1896). On August 12, Therese gave Sister Marie of the Trinity a poem for her twenty-first birthday: *Mon Ciel ici-bas*, later published under the title *Cantique a la Sainte Face:*

Oh! to console you I wish To live unknown on this earth! Your beauty that you know how to hide Unveils all its mystery to me To you I wish to soar aloft!

Seven and Counting...

To classify the gifts of the Holy Spirit, this book follows a traditional division of the nine gifts listed in 1 Corinthians 12:8-10 into three categories. There are gifts of revelation: words of wisdom, word of knowledge, and discernment of spirits. There are gifts of power: faith, healings, and working of miracles. And there are gifts of speech: prophecy,



tongues, and interpretation of tongues. This is a classic and long-standing breakdown of the gifts. We recognize, however, that it is limited and somewhat artificial.

What we do we mean? Prophecy and interpretation of tongues are gifts of speech, but they also depend upon revelation; otherwise, they would be little different from some forms of teaching. The gift of faith involves revelation as well. The gifts of miracles and healing are power gifts, but they are in large part dependent on the gift of faith, and are often related to words of knowledge. The gifts frequently work in conjunction with one another. In addition, there are other spiritual gifts besides the ones St. Paul lists.

Among both Catholics and Protestants, there are some widespread misconceptions about the spiritual gifts that keep people from being open to them. We will address these misunderstandings on both sides.

For many Catholics, the phrase "gifts of the Holy Spirit" immediately brings to mind the seven gifts that Catholic tradition calls sanctifying gifts of the Spirit: wisdom, understanding, counsel, fortitude, knowledge, piety, and fear of the Lord. These are listed in Isaiah 11:1-3, a passage that foretells the Spirit-filled Messiah who was to come. Since the Holy Spirit forms in Christians the character of Jesus the Messiah (Romans 8:29), Catholic tradition holds that these gifts are given to every Christian through the Sacraments of Baptism and Confirmation. Because of the strong emphasis on these seven, many Catholics are not aware that there are any other gifts of the Spirit; but Catholic teaching has never limited the Spirit's gifts to these seven. St. Thomas Aquinas wrote a long treatise on the spiritual gifts in his Summa Theologica, in which he explains several of the gifts St. Paul lists in 1 Corinthians 12-including prophecy, tongues, and miracles—and emphasizes their importance for evangelization.

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Fasting from the Wound of Control & Manipu

Today, I choose to fast from the wound of control and manipulation. When you were a baby and realized that someone would respond to your cries, you discovered your ability to influence your world. As we grow, we learn more and more sophisticated ways of influencing the world around us. The wound of control/manipulation is a distorted way to influence our world. We don't behave based on mutual goodness. Instead, we operate with our own safety as the primary Our control and manipulation make our world more concern. predictable and safe. But others see us as using or taking advantage of



them. We might work very hard to manage circumstances behind the scenes and artfully influence people against their own wills. Let's be especially aware of the people and circumstances we manipulate or control.




TAKE TIME TO ASK YOURSELF: How do I control/manipulate others to get them to do what I want? What happens if I don't control?

Heavenly Father, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, I renounce control/manipulation and repent all the ways in which I have sinned because of them. I reject control/manipulation in every area of my life. I renounce any lies that I have come to believe, including lies such as "I'm out of control; I'm not safe." Send your Holy Spirit to heal, restore, and transform me. I belong to you. I am loved by you. I am chosen by you. I am known to you. Amen.

We must, then, disengage ourselves from everything so as to approach God interiorly and, even in the midst of occupations, withdraw within ourselves. Although it may be for only a moment that I remember I have that Company within myself, doing so is very beneficial. In sum, we must get used to delighting in the fact that it isn't necessary to shout in order to speak to Him, for His Majesty

will give the experience that He is present. With this method, we shall pray vocally with much calm, and any difficulty will be removed. For in the little amount of time we take to force ourselves to be close to this Lord, He will understand us as if through sign language. Thus, if we are about to say the Our Father many times, He will understand us after the first time. He is very fond of taking away our difficulty. Even though we may recite this prayer no more than once in an hour, we can be aware that we are with Him, of what we are asking Him, of His willingness to give us, and how eagerly He remains with us. If we have this awareness, He doesn't want us to be breaking our heads trying to speak a great deal to Him (Chapter 29, No. 5-6).
