

#### Speaking of our Guardian Angels, here are some thoughts by Dr. Peter Kreeft:

- 1. They really exist. Not just in our minds, or our myths, or our symbols, or our culture. They are as real as your dog, or your sister, or electricity.
- 2. They're present, right here, right now, right next to you, reading these words with you.
- 3. They're NOT cute, cuddly, comfortable, chummy, or "cool". They are fearsome and formidable. They are huge. They are warriors.
- 4. They are the real "extraterrestrials," the real "Supermen," the ultimate aliens. Their powers are far beyond those of all fictional creatures.
- 5. They are more brilliant minds than Einstein.
- 6. They can literally move the heavens and the earth if God permits them.
- 7. There are also evil angels, fallen angels, demons, or devils. These, too, are NOT myths. Demon possessions and exorcisms are real!
- 8. Angels are aware of you, even though you can't usually see or hear them. But you can communicate with them. You can talk to them without even speaking.
- 9. You really do have your very own "guardian angel." Everybody does.
- 10. Angels often come disguised. "Do not neglect hospitality, for some have entertained angels unawares"—that's a warning from life's oldest and best instruction manual.
- 11. We are on a protected part of a great battlefield between angels and devils, extending to eternity.
- 12. Angels are sentinels standing at the crossroads where life meets death. They work especially at moments of crisis, at the brink of disaster—for bodies, for souls, and for nations.

#### ABIDING PRESENCE: How Holy Communion Heals Wounds of Abandonment

(From Chapter Four of *Be Transformed: The Healing Power of the Sacraments* by Bob Schuchts) | 7th installment I had the privilege of praying with a priest named Fr. Edward who had a debilitating condition that prevented him from lifting his arms over his head; it caused constant pain in his hands, shoulders, and arms. In our prayer time together, the Holy Spirit revealed to us that his physical ailment originated in unhealed abandonment wounds from early childhood. Suffering for more than forty years, he had reached a crisis point and was desperate for help as these wounds continued crippling his priestly vocation, making it especially difficult to celebrate Mass.

My prayer time with Fr. Edward turned out to be much more intense than either of us anticipated. It reminded me that the Catechism describes contemplative prayer as an "intense time of prayer" where we encounter Jesus and He encounters us in the depths of our hearts (CCC, 2709-2719). As we asked the Holy Spirit to reveal the root issues of Fr. Edward's ailment, he brought him in touch with early childhood memories of abandonment. He sobbed as he relived the searing pain of feeling cut off from both his mother and father's love and nurturing during early childhood.

In prayer, the Holy Spirit showed him that the pain in his hands and arms reflected his longing to be held by his parents, and that his shoulder pain revealed the burdens he carried in feeling responsible for everyone around him. Jesus revealed to him that He was present with him in his childhood suffering and that He would now carry the burdens with him in the priesthood. As Jesus spoke these realities within the depths of Fr. Edward's heart, the pain immediately began to decrease. But the healing was far from finished. Jesus invited him to continue the healing process within the celebration of the Eucharist. While celebrating Mass, Fr. Edward found his heart fully engaged. After receiving Communion, he experienced a loving presence which permeated throughout his body. He heard Jesus say, "You are not alone. I am always with you." By the end of the third day of the conference, he was almost entirely pain-free from these ailments which had been a constant hindrance to his ministry.

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### October is the Month of the Holy Rosary

The word Rosary comes from the Latin word, "Rosarium," which means "Crown of Roses." Friday, October 7, the Feast of Our Lady of the Rosary, is also the First Friday this month. How special is that! (First Friday Mass will be at 7:00 p.m.!)

Starting on Saturday, October 1, and ending on Monday, October 31, let us make an extra effort to develop a daily habit of reciting the rosary while meditating upon its twenty different mysteries. The Rosary devotion goes back to the year 1208, when Our Blessed Mother appeared to a Spanish priest, Fr. Dominic de Guzman, while he was traveling through France to preach against an extreme heresy. Our Lady entrusted the Rosary to him, which is actually a revised version of a Marian Psalter, and added the mysteries of Jesus' and Mary's lives, to use as a spiritual weapon. Countless conversions and miracles are attributed to the daily recitation of the Rosary. You can read much more about the true meaning of the Rosary—and its power—in St. Louis Maria De Montfort's excellent book, *The Secrets of the Rosary*.

If you are hesitant about saying the Rosary alone or you get distracted—as many people do—try using one of the Rosary recitations on YouTube (search "Rosary"). Praying it literally takes FIFTEEN MINUTES! Or try praying with THOUSANDS of fellow Catholics on L.A.'s Relevant Radio (930 on AM radio at 5:00 p.m.) Or join the **St. Therese Rosary Makers, a group which meets weekly on Mondays from 2:30 to 4:30 p.m. in the Avila Room of the Parish Offices**. This small group, which also prays the Rosary together, has made thousands and thousands of rosaries that have been sent all over the world. 

### Quiet Listening Prayer

From *THE WAY OF PERFECTION* by St. Teresa of Avila: A person feels the greatest delight in his body and a great satisfaction in his soul. He feels so happy with merely being close to the fount that he is satisfied even without drinking. It doesn't seem there is anything else for him to desire. The faculties are still; they wouldn't want to be busy; everything else seems to hinder them from loving. But they are not completely lost; they can think of who it is they are near, for two of them are free. The will is the one that is captive here. If there is some sorrow that can be

experienced while in this state, that sorrow comes from a realization that the will must return to the state of being free. The intellect wouldn't want to understand more than one thing; nor would the memory want to be occupied with anything else. Persons in this prayer see that only this one thing is necessary, and everything else disturbs them. They don't want the body to move because it seems they would thereby lose that peace; thus, they don't dare stir. It pains them to speak; in their saying "Our Father" just once, a whole hour passes. They are so close that they see they are understanding as though through signs. They are within the palace, near the King, and they see that He is beginning to give them here His kingdom. It doesn't seem to them that they are in the world, nor would they want to see or hear about anything other than their God. Nothing pains them, nor does it seem anything ever will. In sum, while this prayer lasts, they are so absorbed and engulfed with the satisfaction and delight they experience within themselves that they do not remember there is more to desire; they would eagerly say with St. Peter: "Lord, let us build three dwelling places here" (Chapter 31, No. 4).

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
### LAST DAY TO REGISTER FOR RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

on Patience and Acceptance

Today, I choose to feast on patience and acceptance. While anger often produces immediate results, those outcomes are often not what we'd like--and they come at the price of infecting our relationships with bitterness, resentment, and unforgiveness. Patience, though, actually produces the outcomes that we really hope for. It replaces anger and builds a sense of belonging and acceptance. The chief priests and Pharisees, tired of being embarrassed by Jesus, moved in their anger to have Him killed. They mock, insult, and lie in order to rid themselves of Him. In doing so, they reject the One they claim to worship. Jesus, though, patiently accepts the circumstance, embarrassment, and humiliation of the moment. He wants what the Father wants: Redemption for the world. He is confident in Who He is, confident in His Father, and confident in His mission. Embrace the good news of patience and acceptance that is available to you, and celebrate your restoration and healing in the Eucharist.

Take time to ask yourself:

What are some ways I would like to be accepted? What types of things make me impatient?



Heavenly Father, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, and by the power of the Holy Spirit, I accept the gifts of patience and acceptance in my life. I accept my identity as the beloved child of a gracious Father God. I thank you for my life purposes and the strength to fulfill it. I accept your healing grace. Amen.

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### The Real St. Therese



An installment from *The Passion of Thérèse of Lisieux* by Guy Faucher

3. Her entrance into darkness | Discovery of her vocation (April – September 1896): On May 10, a dream restored Thérèse's confidence. In the d r e a m, the Foundress of the Carmel in France,

Anne of Jesus, assured her of the affection of the inhabitants of Heaven. Thérèse expressed her preoccupation in a spontaneous question: "Oh Mother! I beg you, tell me whether God will leave me for a long time on earth. Will He soon come to get me?" The reply pleased her: "Yes, soon, soon... I promise you." A second typically Theresian question followed: "Is God pleased with me?" "He is pleased, very pleased!" was the reply. Twenty days later, there was another consoling sign. Mother Marie de Gonzague gave Thérèse a second spiritual brother, Fr. Roulland of the Foreign Missions of Paris. The Carmelite saw herself confirmed in her desire to sacrifice herself, and pray for missionaries and the people who were to receive the Good News. The next day, May 31, Thérèse gave her novice a poem that does not need any commentary: "My Beloved, take my whole life. I want to suffer; I want to die for you. Lord, you have told us yourself: 'Greater love hath no man than to give his life for those he loves.' And yet, O Jesus, you are the One I love above all others. It is late, already it is evening. Come and guide me, Lord, along my way, with your Cross I am climbing the hill. Stay with me, Pilgrim from Heaven. Your Love is my only martyrdom. The more I feel it burn within me, the more does my soul desire you... Jesus, make me die of love for you!"

Whatever the reasons, or the occasions, surrounding the composition of all her poems written in May, June, and July of 1896, this idea of martyrdom seemed to haunt Thérèse. "Martyrdom was the dream of my youth, and this dream has grown in me within Carmel's cloisters," she wrote. In fact, France's policy against Religious Congregations was such that, at times, the Carmelites could have easily believed that they might shed their blood. Thérèse expressed the desire for martyrdom as the apex of her many desires. "But above all, my Beloved Savior, I would shed my blood for you even to the very last drop." That same month she was overjoyed when she heard a talk on the Sixteen Carmelites of Compiegne by the postulator for their cause of Beatification.

### Continuationism vs Cessationism

In the mid-19th century, there was a major resurgence of healing within Protestantism, which continued among the Methodist, Presbyterian, Baptist, and Dutch Reformed Churches. The key leaders of the Faith Cure



movement came from these denominations. Healing became one of the most controversial subjects—if not the most controversial—among Protestant churches by the last quarter of the 19th century. Thus, healing was rediscovered within Protestantism even prior to the birth of Pentecostalism. It was not so much the gift of healing that was emphasized, however, as it was God's healing in response to prayers of faith for the sick person Healing was connected to the promises of God and was possible without the *gift* of healing.

With the birth of Pentecostalism, the belief that God was restoring His gifts as they were in the Apostolic Age came into Protestantism. This view, called "continuationism," meaning the gifts are continuing in the Church, was a major departure from "cessationism," meaning the gifts of healing, miracles, tongues, interpretation of tongues, and prophecy had ceased. The division between cessationism and continuationism still exists among Protestant churches today; however, the number of continuationists is greatly surpassing cessationists outside Europe and North America. It has been estimated that approximately 80% of Protestant Christians in the majority world are continuationists.

A primary reason for 16th-century Protestants developing a cessationist position was the Reformation itself. Catholics were using the evidence of continued healings and miracles to argue against the legitimacy of the Protestant movement. In response, the Protestants tried to undercut this authority. Protestants, like Catholics, saw miracles as evidence of correct doctrine. The argument was that since miracles proved correct doctrine, and since Protestants believed some Catholic doctrines were inconsistent with the teaching of the Bible, then the miracles must be counterfeit. These early Protestants wanted to reduce the authority for doctrine to the Bible alone. Therefore, the gifts of healing and miracles no longer existed. Those gifts ended with the death of the apostles or, in the view of some, with the canonization of the Bible (the finalizing of the list of books that belong in the Bible).


