

are many people in Southern California who, like Zacchaeus, are wealthy and yet longing for more and who don't know that Jesus is that "more," that Abundant Life. You and I can help connect them to Jesus by being on the alert and ready to say hello, to witness to Jesus somehow, to ask them if they would like prayer for anything, and then pray with them in the authority and power of His Holy Name. A simple, loving Jesusencounter like that can facilitate another person's taking a step closer to our Lord and lead to many other people being helped by that person (like Zacchaeus deciding to give half of his wealth to the poor!).

One somewhat easy way to reach out to another person is to carry a few copies of the school brochure with you and, when there is an opportunity, to ask what he/she thinks about the current state of education, and then say a few words about our special school and offer to give them a brochure. You never know who and how the Holy Spirit chooses to bring people together, right? To encourage all of us here at St. Therese Church, here is a quote from George Weigel addressing an open letter to the Synod folks in Rome: "Catholic schools in America are a treasure the country is beginning to recognize as such. When America's state-run schools were failing students and parents during pandemic lockdowns, Catholic elementary schools stepped into the breach, providing on-site and online instruction that government schools were incapable of mounting—thanks in large part to self-interested, unionized teachers. By contrast, Catholic school teachers tend to think vocationally, and that made a huge difference." (From Chapter Five of Be Transformed: The Healing Power of the Sacraments by Bob Schuchts) | 2nd installment

With Adam and Eve's rebellion, the misuse of power (sin) and powerlessness (wound) reared their ugly heads. When Eve succumbed to the serpent's temptation, Adam abdicated his role and failed to stand in his proper authority, allowing the evil one dominion over all the earth (Genesis 3; Romans 5:12-14). In choosing to surrender their God-given power and authority over to the eternally powerless one, Adam and Eve also disconnected from the power of the Holy Spirit. As a result, they ended up debilitating themselves and the rest of the human race with the same wound of powerlessness. After their disobedience, God revealed to Adam that his work, once a source of joy and fulfillment, would become laborious and difficult (due to this curse of powerlessness).

Every son and daughter of our first parents has to deal with these consequences of powerlessness, domination, and control. We are all prone to the same weaknesses. With our loss of grace, we toil in labor, fear domination, and tend to become passive, controlling, and rebellious, all the while experiencing an inherent weakness in our attempts to resist sin. Though expressed in myriad of ways, this wound of powerlessness is experienced by all.

These human weaknesses and abuses of power have played out throughout history and were on full display during Jesus' crucifixion, when the grotesque evil of worldly power and cowardly powerlessness reached a crescendo. Jesus, on the other hand, gave witness to God's holy power, even while willingly experiencing the powerlessness of having his body nailed to the cross. Continuing to abide with the Father and Holy Spirit in the face of evil, he endured the cross and despised its shame (Hebrews 12:1-2). Accepting the curse of our powerlessness and victimization, be made it possible for us to become victors once again (2 Cor 2:14).

Rising from the dead, Jesus fully revealed God's mighty power and restored God's dominion on behalf of the human race. Before ascending into heaven, he promised his disciples a share in his resurrection power: "You will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes upon you, and you will be my witnesses" (Acts 1:8, emphasis added). This promise was fulfilled on the feast of Pentecost.



To do so, pick up one of the ALL SOULS envelopes from the pews or from the packet mailed to your home (or use any blank envelope), enter the names of your deceased loved ones, and return it with an offering by dropping it in the collection basket or bringing it to the office (there is a mail slot to the right of the office door).

How to Make Five First Saturdays Devotion: Receive Holy Communion. Receiving Jesus in Communion gives us the grace and strength to fight the daily battles that threaten our spiritual vitality. Frequent reception helps us grow in our love of God and neighbor. To offer our Communions in reparation for the offenses committed against the Immaculate Heart of Mary, we must receive Communion worthily, with all due reverence. There are three conditions for receiving Holy Communion worthily: 1) Be in the state of grace: This means to be free from mortal sin. "Anyone aware of having sinned mortally must not receive Communion without having received absolution in the Sacrament of Penance" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, CCC 1415). What is a mortal sin? The Catechism explains that mortal sin "destroys charity in the heart of man by a grave violation of God's law; it turns man away from God" (CCC 1855). For a sin to be mortal, or deadly, one must be aware that the act is sinful and conscientiously commit it anyway. Examples of mortal sins include murder, adultery, fornication, homosexual acts, theft, abortion, euthanasia, using pornography, and taking advantage of the poor. The Church teaches that intentionally skipping Mass on a Sunday or holy day of obligation when one is able to attend is also a mortal sin. If you are aware of any unconfessed mortal sins on your soul, you should confess them and receive absolution before receiving Holy Communion.



October is the Month of the Holy Rosary

Most of us know the famous story of our Lady of Lepanto, after which October 7th became the Feast of Our Lady of the Rosary, due to the incredible odds that the greatly outnumbered Catholic Europeans were able to repel the Muslim Turks. Pope Pius V called on all of Europe to pray the Rosary. It is said that the Catholic sailors prayed the Rosary nonstop through the night before the final battle, and that it completely demoralized the Turkish fleet.

Some of us may have heard the story of the eight Jesuit priests who survived the atomic bombing on Hiroshima on August 6, 1945. They were only eight blocks from "Ground Zero," where everything was annihilated. The eight men walked away from the atomic blast to live into old age without any radiation poisoning. One of them, Fr. Hubert Schiffer, wrote a book about it called, "The Rosary of Hiroshima" (1953). They were interviewed numerous times and examined over 200 times! Similarly, the Franciscan friary, established by Fr. Maximillian Kolbe in Nagasaki, was left unscathed by the bomb. The survivors believed they survived because they were living the message of Fatima.

In 1964, there was an attempted Communist takeover in Brazil that was thwarted by zealous Rosary crusaders. The Irish-born priest, Fr. Patrick Peyton, who coined the phrase, "the family that prays together, stays together," was said to have accepted funding from the CIA because THEY knew how powerful the Rosary was. So, starting in 1959, Fr. Peyton was proclaiming that the Rosary is an "offensive weapon that will destroy Communism—the great evil that seeks to destroy the Faith." A recent 2019 film called, "Guns and Rosaries," narrated by Martin Sheen, highlights some of the activities of "the Rosary Priest," as he promoted the Family Rosary on radio stations throughout the world.

And, finally, there is the story of guns falling to rosaries in Manilla, Philippines, in1986. Two million people became part of a groundswell to overthrow the dictatorship of Ferdinand Marcos. Sister Ocariza, a Daughter of St. Paul, and 16 other nuns led a Rosary rally against rolling military tanks. Sister said, "staring down those tanks was the scariest experience of my life, but I believed God was there." The tanks stopped and the soldiers joined the protesters in reciting the Rosary—that was really a miracle! Sister Ocariza believes that God delivered them from the hand of the dictator and saved the country from violence. She said she looks back to the time as a source of courage and as a reminder to stand for what is right. "God was there as if the seed of democracy was being planted."

The Real St. Therese



At the beginning of February 1897, Therese wrote a poem called, A Theophane Vinard. It expresses her spiritual friendship with the thirty-one-year-old martyr

who was to be her inseparable companion during those last months. Since she had read his letters, everything about him attracted her: his youth, his martyrdom in Vietnam, but even more, his soul, his sentiments, especially his cheerfulness: "My soul is like his. I have read the story of his life, which interested and moved me more than I can say. As a result, I have written some verses which are guite personal." She expressed her desire to go to the missions "if God calls me there one day..." and, like Theophane, "to be gathered up soon." Another young saint attracted her attention: St. Stanislaus Kostka, a novice of the Society of Jesus. He was the subject of her last play, and she projected her own aspirations onto this historical character who became her mouthpiece: "Oh! how happy I am... Soon I will contemplate Jesus no longer under the appearance of a weak child but in all the splendor of His glory... I have no regrets about anything on earth, but I do have one desire, a desire so great that I could not be happy in Heaven if it were not fulfilled. Tell me, Mary, if the blessed can still work for the salvation of souls. If I cannot work in Paradise for the glory of Jesus, I prefer to remain in exile and go on still fighting for Him! The Virgin answered in the affirmative. Then he asked her if he "could return to earth and protect those still fighting." Another affirmative reply was given. In this play she wrote, it is not difficult to see Therese's desire which was to be repeated more frequently from this time until her death.

The Messianic Age

The Prophet Isaiah foretold that one day the Messiah would come, and the way He would be known would be by the Spirit of God resting on Him, empowering Him to do mighty deeds of healing and deliverance: "The Spirit of the Lord God is upon me, because



the Lord has anointed me to bring good news to the poor; He has sent me to bind up the brokenhearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and the opening of the prisons to those who are bound; to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor, and the day of vengeance of our God; to comfort all who mourn; to grant to those who mourn in Zion—to give them a beautiful headdress instead of ashes, the oil of gladness instead of mourning, the garment of praise instead of a faint spirit" (Isaiah 61:1-3).

The Messianic Age was to be an age when God's power would be released on Earth, saving people from all the tragic consequences of the Fall, resulting in uncontainable joy and gladness: "Then the eyes of the blind shall be opened, and the ears of the deaf unstopped; then shall the lame man leap like a deer, and the tongue of the mute sing for joy" (Isaiah 35:5-6).

From the very beginning of Jesus' mission, the Gospels show these prophecies being fulfilled, first in Him and then in His disciples.



FROM THE WAY OF PERFECTION
