

FIFTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME February 5, 2 Letter from the Pastor

Blessed Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time!!!

Thank you to all of you who made the Candlemas celebration last Thursday evening extra beautiful!!! Jesus speaks of light again in today's Gospel, so here is a little story to encourage all of us—especially those of us who struggle to trust that Jesus is really at work in the middle of all the darkness:

TEENAGE WITNESS: A teenage girl named Anne got a summer job working as a maid in a big hotel on Cape Cod. Her job was to clean ten rooms every day. Over the summer, Anne met all kinds of interesting people, including a few celebrities. Of all the people she met, however, one stood out in her mind above all the others. She called him "Mr. Smith." Mr. Smith showed up one weekend with a small leather travel bag. When Anne went to clean his room the next day, he stuck his head out of the door and said, "Forget about cleaning my room. Just give me a couple of clean towels." The next two days he did the same thing. It wasn't until midweek that Mr. Smith allowed Anne to enter and clean. As she did, he talked to her and even helped her make the bed. On Saturday, Anne cleaned her usual ten rooms, including the room of Mr. Smith. After she finished, Anne was walking down the street on her way to 4:30 Mass. Suddenly a car pulled up; it was Mr. Smith. Did she want a ride home? She said she was going to church and would welcome a ride there. Once Anne was inside the car, Mr. Smith began bombarding her with questions. How often did she go to church? Why did she go, when lots of teenagers didn't? How good were the sermons? Did she receive Communion when she went?

When they arrived at the church, Mr. Smith surprised Anne by asking if he might attend Mass with her. She began to feel a little strange about his questions and his interest in the Mass. She felt even stranger when Mr. Smith knelt down inside the church, shut his eyes, and remained that way the rest of the Mass. When Mass ended, Mr. Smith did something even stranger. He got up and hurried outside the church, without even saying goodbye. The next day, when Anne went to clean his room, the little leather travel bag was gone. In its place was a small package with a note. She unfolded the note and read it. It went something like this:

"Dear Anne, The gift inside this box is for the beautiful thing you've done for me, without even knowing it. My marriage has been rather shaky lately—so much so that I finally told my wife that I was moving out for a few days to think things over. The more I thought, the more confused I got. Then you came along. Your beautiful faith in God touched me deeply. When I attended Mass with you, it was for the first time in ten years. During that Mass, God gave me an insight into my problem and the desire to stay with my wife. I'm going home grateful to God and grateful to you for being a shining light in a time when my world was very dark. I will never forget you for helping me rediscover my faith. -Mr. Smith."

Inside the package was a gold chain with a beautiful gold cross attached to it. That story is a beautiful illustration of what Jesus meant in today's Gospel, when He said to His disciples: "You are the light of the world. Your light must shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Heavenly Father."

May each of us follow that teenager's compelling witness this week and reach out to just two people who are not going to church and invite them to consider coming back.

From Chapter Six of "Be Transformed: The Healing Power of the Sacraments" by Bob Schuchts (How Holy Orders Heals Wounds of Confusion) First Installment

Father Knows Best was a popular television show of my earliest memories. Championing traditional values, the show symbolized the American culture in which I was raised in the late 1950s and early 1960s. This excerpt from the book of Sirach (3:2-5) highlights the virtues of honor and respect for authority: "For the Lord sets a father in honor over his children and confirms a mother's authority over her sons. Those who honor their father atone for sins; they store up riches who respect their mother. When they pray, they are heard"

During my formative years, these words of wisdom from Sirach matched the world I experienced around me. I was taught to reverence God and honor his ordained authority. Expectations and roles, following this God-given order, remained clear at home, at church, and at school. Certainly not everyone lived these ideals perfectly in the 1950s, but the value of honoring authority remained unquestioned throughout the culture in most environments. Inside and outside the family, neither disrespect nor rebellion was tolerated, meeting with firm discipline whenever the boundaries of honor were violated. Among the Catholic faithful, the pope, bishops, and priests represented the hierarchy of authority, and thus garnered the highest honor and respect in our communities. (Continues weekly)



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"The Flame of Love" Sessions




For all those interested—including those who have not attended any of our previous sessions—we will continue to meet every

The Real St. Therese



An installment from The Passion of Thérèse of Lisieux by Guy Faucher

On September 2, 1897, Therese fancied some roast meat and soup, but she ate the meat with distaste. She preferred a chocolate eclair which she had unexpectedly asked for. Sister Genevieve had passed on her chicken, and on the 16th, some artichokes that Mme. Guerin had brought along specially. In that

late Summer, Therese showed interest in the fruit and flowers. On August 11th she still had enough strength to weave two crowns out of cornflowers for the Virgin of the Smile. It was also for Mary that she wrote four lines in ink with a trembling hand—they were the last lines that she was ever to write.

On Friday, September 10, Dr. de Corniere made his first visit since he had gone away and said he was "puzzled" by her physical state. The following day, her condition deteriorated.

The beginning of the end (17 - 30 September) - A. The continued deterioration of the left lung: "This is a bad sign," said Dr. de Corniere when he saw the recurrence of swelling in Therese's feet on September 12. On the 14th, he gave her about fifteen days to live. This time he was right; she was so weak that when the strong Sister Aimee of Jesus lifted her up in her arms while the bed was being remade, it was feared she would die. Yet, until the very end, Therese was to baffle everyone. On the afternoon of Saturday, September 18, she had a new lease on life. She showed interest in the altar cloth that Sister Genevieve was embroidering beside her bed. She admired the bright red Virginia creeper that was climbing up above the chestnut trees. She was pleased when she saw her features reflected in the chalice of Father Denis who celebrated his first Mass there on September 19.

The next day, Mother Marie de Gonzague was asked to come and see the patient's extreme thinness. She was very shocked and said: "Who is this little girl who is so thin?" Therese, who could still joke, replied, "A skeleton." However, the following day she asked: "What is this agony? It seems to me I'm in it all the time!" These days brought with them intense suffering and a crisis caused by the extreme difficulty she had in breathing. The escalation continued, with the tuberculosis attacking the remaining part of the left lung. Therese could only express herself by signs. The doctor could not understand how she was still living. On the Sunday before she died, she said: "My life hangs only on a thin thread." How could she in fact live on when her lungs were gone? She was heard to cry out, "Mama! Earth's air is denied me; when will God grant me the air of heaven?" This time she had indeed reached the end of the road.

"John the Plunger"

The power and gifts of the Holy Spirit became manifest in Jesus' public ministry. It began when Jesus Himself was filled with the Holy Spirit at His baptism in the Jordan River. John the Baptist had appeared in the desert, calling the people repentance and baptizing them as a sign of cleansing from sin. John did not seek



to draw attention to himself but to the One who was to come. He cried out, "I baptize you with water, but He who is mightier than I is coming, the strap of whose sandals I am not worthy to untie. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire" (Luke 3:16).

The meaning of the word "baptize" is key to understanding John's message. Long before it became a Christian word, baptize was an ordinary Greek word. It meant to "plunge into water, immerse, soak, drench." To his contemporaries, the title "John the Baptist" literally meant "John the Plunger." His message was, in effect, "I am plunging you into the Jordan River as a sign of repentance, but this is only a preparation for the far greater immersion the Messiah will give you. He is going to plunge you into the Holy Spirit. He is going to inundate you with the very life of God!"

John was surprised when Jesus Himself came to him to be baptized (Matthew 3:14). As the Son of God, Jesus was sinless; He did not need to repent for anything. Why, then, did He undergo John's baptism? It was Jesus' way of totally accepting the Father's plan: that He would be counted among sinners and would bear the penalty for sin. In humility, Jesus chose to be in solidarity with sinners, knowing that his decision would lead to the cross.

As soon as Jesus came up from the water, the Holy Spirit descended on Him "in bodily form, like a dove" (Luke 3:22). He would baptize people in the Spirit because He Himself had been baptized in the Spirit. At the same moment, God's voice was heard from Heaven: "You are my beloved Son; with you I am well pleased."

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
